FACILITIES

Slipway

Little progress has been made on the wash down facilities and finger jetties although Council have indicated that work should start in February. Because of the delays we cannot start the upgrade to the women's showers and toilet facilities in order to provide easy unisex access to these facilities for Sailability and others (we will connect up to the sewer via the wash down facility).

Another joint Slipway and Hardstand (SHOC) and Facilities meeting is taking place this week as overall land use is going to come under pressure when the work starts on the slipway. A new wire has been purchased for the slipway winch as the old one has reached the end of its safe life.

We have some problems with the number of long-term boats on the hard, many of which are way over the timing the owner gave the Slip Master when they originally slipped. We need to ensure a good turnover of boats as the charging regime is based on this quick turnover and we only have a limited hardstand area. Slipway income is therefore affected, as are potential customers who really are only up for a quick slip of a week or so, when owners decide to use the hardstand as a storage area or sales berth. This prevents use of the limited area available.

We understand there are situations when problems are encountered and the intended quick slip becomes much longer than intended. In these situations we ask that you advise the Slip Master immediately so that the yard planning can be modified to accommodate you.

We are currently reviewing the hardstand conditions to more clearly address these issues in writing (currently the verbal contract covers your intended timing on the hard and the written one the conditions under which you use the slipway). The new contract will more clearly outline obligations and the charges that apply.

Trailer lift

This has recently been modified to allow boats to be driven in with mast in place so if you want to use it contact Faye at the office or book with Gary Wagstaff.

Lighting work

We have yet to start improving the lighting around the trailer park for two reasons – the cost of one commercially made light stand was more than our whole budget and getting contractors is difficult as they are very busy on other jobs. We also have some other electrical work to improve exterior shed lighting and security around the Club.

Wharf Crane

The new crane on the end of the wharf for Sailability, Flying Fifteens and others has been constructed and is about to be installed. The contractor has requested access and is about to start installation shortly.

Asphalt

We are about to fix potholes and other asphalt areas that are starting to break up. We are also going to put asphalt down at the entrance to the northern end of the “black” shed so that rescue and training boats have better access, which will also fix the puddle that has developed outside that entrance. There will be a 48-hour restriction on traffic over this once it is done, so we need to co-ordinate the timing of classes with the contractor and the weather!

The beautiful Rona

Some of you will have had the opportunity to see the beautiful yacht Rona when she was in the EBYMBC yard recently. Now sitting in Chaffers Marina, she is a rare treat for Wellington.

Robert Logan built her in Auckland in 1893 for Alexander Turnbull, described then as a Merchant of Wellington and Commodore of RPNYC. Rona was named after the legendary Maori goddess of the moon. She is a GL Watson design, 43' 6" LOA x 8' 6" beam x 6' 4" draft. Although she was gaff rigged she was one of the first to be fitted with the new-fangled pole mast instead of a topmast for her topsail.

Later in 1893 she moved to Wellington and has been in the Cook Strait area ever since. Her outstanding 71-year racing career ended when she broke from her mooring in the harbour in 1964. She was rescued by the Harbour Master, but had damaged her rudder stock, and was badly scratched. Although saved from the scrap heap, two years later she was beached on the Kaikoura Coast, and her future looked doubtful until rescued by owner John Palmer in 1981.

Slipping her in the EBYMBC yard was a special challenge, with her very narrow beam the travel-lift strops had to be tied together at the top to stop her flopping from side to side. We look forward to seeing her under sail.



Just a quick word from the Vice Commodore

Series underway

Despite some weather set backs we are under way with 8 races now sailed in the Spring Championship/Club Handicap series. Don't know where all the boats are but we have had great sailing.

In the New Year regattas loom high on the agenda and we have had great input from members to assist in all but the Noelex 22 Nationals on Wellington Anniversary weekend, end of January 2005. So please let me know if you can help on either Race Start boat, Patrol boats or in club house operations.

Race Officer Courses.

We are organizing a series of Race Management courses in the early New Year for members or partners and friends who would like to be involved in the Race Management aspect of the club. Yachting NZ has recently created a Club Race Officer rating which creates opportunities for members who only want to be involved at club level but still leave the door open to complete the total National Race Officer qualification.

Safety.

The Sailing Committee has agreed that a roster will operate on a Division basis weekly and that 3 people from each Division will make themselves available. Responsibilities will include duty on Patrol Boats and being the Race Control Office to assist with Race management each sailing day.

This will mean that over the whole season each Div could be called on maybe twice only. Personnel will be required to be on the Committee boat for race results, assist with the start and finish procedures and one person in the Race Control HQ to assist with race results and computer input. Plus someone to be on a Rescue/ Patrol boat if required.

Division 1 TY provided personnel for 27 November & 4th December. It will be the responsibility of TY Div 2 to provide 3 people for Dec 11 and TY Div 3 for Saturday 18 Dec. A full Division roster will be posted for the New Year right through until the end of the season. Please put your hands up.

Patrol & Rescue Boats.

It is absolutely imperative that all boats that are on the water in the capacity of Committee, Patrol and/or Rescue boats are manned with a minimum of two people competent to handle an emergency. Our club Risk Management situation requires that we do not put any of our Patrol boats out in a race management situation unless they are properly manned.

Those skippers appointed to all committee, patrol & rescue boats must ensure they advise the Vice Commodore each racing day prior to proceeding out on the water by 12 noon that they have a fully manned boat to proceed out onto the race area, otherwise they are **not** to leave the club moorings or confines. Member Profiles – Past and Present

Colin Baylis joined our club in the fifties and was active in speed boat racing. His first boat was a Grey Nurse design called Cee Bee. When the speed boats moved from Evans Bay to Onepotu in the Porirua Harbour Colin left the Evans Bay Club but returned around 1964 shortly after he and Jeanette married. Colin and Jeanette purchased a Hartley Cabin day boat, which was approximately 16 foot in length and in need of repair. They then got involved in the power boat squadron at Evans Bay. Colin was one of a group of boaties who lobbied for a launching ramp to be built at Lyall Bay.

In 1970 Colin and Jeanette purchased a section in the Marlborough Sounds and took the Hartley down there on the ferry where they cruised extensively. In 1977 they became involved with the Cruising Division at Port Nick, as he was a member of both clubs. Colin raced for approximately a year with John Boyce on a boat called Good Hope and was a keen competitor.

In November 1980 Colin informed Jeanette that he had found a boat which they named *Omega Of Wellington* and which he thought they should purchase, they went on to race this boat successfully on handicap in the Port Nick Cruising Division races. However, as crew changed, the boat became too much to handle by themselves & it was decided to sell her. They later purchased Jeanette's present boat *Omega II of Wellington*, affectionately known as '*the Bus*'.

Colin and Jeanette sailed *the Bus* with some success but more importantly, with a lot of pleasure. Colin spent his last summer in the Marlborough Sounds, an area he loved with a passion. He passed away in January 2001.



Jeanette is still captain of *the Bus*, but is considering her options, as she is now the proud owner of a camper van and has joined a Campervan Club. Following Colin's death, Jeanette took a more active interest in our club, assisting Faye Bishop and serving on the executive as Rear Commodore.

Colin and Jeanette enjoyed our club but also put a lot back into it. There were very few functions that they did not attend.
